**DR. HIRAM MCGOWAN**  
Dr. Hiram McGowan passed away early Thursday morning, January 31st at Community Hospital, Warsaw, where he resided since October 31, 1942. Dr. McGowan was born in Malone, Franklin County on December 11, 1856. He is the last to survive of seven sons. He received his Doctor's Degree at Ann Arbor, Mich. and practiced medicine over forty years. Much of this was in Buffalo and Brooklyn. His wife, Ada passed away a few years before he came to Rock Glen to live as a permanent resident in October, 1924.

Here he located as a private citizen (although still a registered doctor) in the house of the D. E. Jenison Estate. This choice was made as he had been a friend of the Jenisons in both Buffalo and Brooklyn.

He spent his time here enjoying life and writing poems which he liked to read and talk about among the people.

In October, 1942, because of failing health, he made his permanent residence at the hospital in Warsaw. He liked his life there also. On his last birthday, December 11th the doctors and nurses helped to make it a particular day of pleasure for him. Also a box containing little gifts and cards, was taken to him from friends in Rock Glen. Dr. McGowan was a member of the Medical Society and of the Masons. The nearest relatives who survive are three nieces in Massachusetts.

Funeral services were held on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Rock Glen Baptist church with Rev. E. T. Rowe of Warsaw Methodist church officiating.

Pallbearers were: Andrew Dutton, Robert Dutton and Scott Wilson of Rock Glen and Glenn Herrmann of Wyoming. Following the funeral service the deceased was taken to Buffalo for cremation.
